10	WHEREAS, the use of all single use shopping bags (plastic, paper, biodegradable) have
12	severe environmental impacts, including greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, litter, harm to
13	wildlife, atmospheric acidification, water consumption and solid waste generation; and

15	WHEREAS, many of these single-use carry out bags are made from plastic or other
16	material that does not readily decompose; and

18	WHEREAS, approximately Nineteen Billion (19,000,000,000) single-use plastic bags
19	are used annually in California but less than 5% are recycled; and

21	WHEREAS, numerous studies have decumented the prevalence of single-use carryout
22	littering the environment, blocking storm mains and buling beauties; and

24	WHEREAS, plastic bags are a significant source of marine debris and are hazardous to
25	marine animals and birds which often confuse single-use plastic bags for a source of food
26	resulting in injury and death to birds and marine utimals; and

28	WHEREAS from an overall environmental and economic perspective, the best
29	alternative to single-use plastic and paper curryou bags is a shift to reusable bags; and
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31	WHEREAS, there are several alternative to single-use carryout bags readily available in
32	Mill Valley; and
33	WHEREAS, an important goal of the City is to procure and use sustainable products and

38	emissions, waste, litter and marine pollution and to protect the public health and welfare

- 75 The following definitions apply to this Chapter:
- 76 A. "Checkout bag" means a carryout bag intended to convey or protect goods, products or 77 packaged food products provided by a store to a customer at the point of sale.
- 78 B. "Customer" means any person purchasing goods from a story
 - C. "Operator" means the person in control of, or having the responsibility for, the operation of a store, which may include, but is not limited to, the owner of the store.
 - D. "Plastic carryout bag" means any bag made predominantly of plastic derived from either petroleum or a biologically-based source, such as corn or other plant sources, which is provided to a customer at the point of sale. "Plastic carryout bag" includes compostable and biodegradable bags but does not include reusable bags or product bags.
 - E. "Postconsumer recycled material" means a material that would otherwise be destined for solid waste disposal, having completed its intended end use and product life cycle. "Postconsumer recycled material" does not include materials and by-products generated from, and commonly reused within, an original manufacturing and fabripation process.
 - F. "Product bag mean any bag without handles used exclusively to carry produce, meats, or other food item, such as buy foods to the point of sale maile a store or to prevent such food items from coming into direct contact with other purchased items.
 - G. 'Recyclable' means material that can be sorted, cleansed, and reconstituted using available recycling collection programs for the purpose of using the altered form in the manufacture of a new product. "Recycling" des not include burning, incinerating, converting, or otherwise thermally destroying solid waste.
 - H. "Reovelable paper carryout bag" means a paper bag that meets all of the following requirements: (1) contains no old growth fiber, (2) is one hundred percent (100%) recyclable overall and contains a minimum of forty percent (40%) post-consumer recycled material; (3) is capable of composition consistent with the timeline and specifications of the American Society of Testing and Materials (ASTM) Standard D6400; (4) is accepted for recycling in curbside programs in the City of Mill Valley; (5) has printed on the bag the name of the manufacturer, the location (country) where the bag was manufactured, and the percentage of postconsumer recycled material used; and (6) displays the word "Recyclable" in a highly visible manner on the outside of the bag.
 - I. "Reusable bag" means a bag with handles that is specifically designed and manufactured for multiple reuse and meets all of the following requirements: (1) has a minimum lifetime of 125 uses, which for purposes of this subsection, means the capability of carrying a minimum of 22 pounds 125 times over a distance of at least 175 feet; (2) has a minimum volume of 15 liters; (3)

109 is machine washable or is made from a material that can be cleaned or disinfected; (4) does not 110 contain lead, cadmium, or any other heavy metal in toxic amounts; (5) has printed on the bag, or 111 on a tag that is permanently affixed to the bag, the name of the manufacturer, the location 112 (country) where the bag was manufactured, a statement that the bag does not contain lead, 113 cadmium, or any other heavy metal in toxic amounts, and the percentage of postconsumer recycled material used, if any; and (6) if made of plastic, is a minimum of at least 2.25 mils thick. 114 115 J. 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7.40.080 Enforcement and violation-penalty.

A. The City Manager or his or her designee shall have primary responsibility for enforcement of this Chapter. The staff designee is authorized to promulgate begulations and to take any and all other actions reasonable and necessary to entorize this Chapter including, but not limited to, investigating violations, issuing fines and entering the premises of any store during business hours.

B. If the City Manager or his or her designed betermines that a violation of this Chapter has occurred, he/she will issue a william warning notice to be operator of a store that a violation has occurred and the potential penalties that will apply for a ture violations.

C. Any store that violates or fails to compil with any of the requirements of this Chapter after a written warning notice has been issued for that violation shall be guilty of an infraction.

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E. A fine shall be imposed for each day a violation occurs or is allowed to continue.

F. Any store operator who receives a written warning notice or fine may request an administrative review of the accuracy of the determination or the propriety of any fine issued, by filing a written notice of appeal with the City Manager_no later than 30 days after receipt of a written warning notice or fine, as applicable. The notice of appeal must include all facts supporting the appeal and any statements and evidence, including copies of all written documentation and a list of any witnesses, that the appellant wishes to be considered in connection with the appeal. The appeal will be heard by the City Manager. The City Manager or his or her designee will conduct a hearing concerning the appeal within 45 days from the date that the notice of appeal is filed, or on a later date if agreed upon by the appellant and the City Manager, and will give the appellant 10 days prior written notice of the date of the hearing. The City Manager or his or her designee may sustain, rescind, or modify the written warning notice or fine, as applicable, by written decision. The City Manager will have the power to waive any portion of the fine in a manner consistent with the decision. The decision of the City Manager is final and effective on the date of service of the written decision, is not subject to further administrative review, and constitutes the final administrative decision.

7.40.090 Severability.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid by a decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, that decision will not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the ordinance. The City of Walley hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance and each and every section, subsection sentence, clause, or phrase not declared invalid or unconstitutional without regard to whether any portion of this ordinance would be subsequently declared invalid.

Nothing in this ordinance is intended to create any confirment, power or duty that is in conflict with any federal or state law.

SECTION 3. Any provision of the Mill Valley Code or appendices thereto inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance, to the extent of such inconsistencies and no further, is hereby repealed or modified to that extent necessary to effect the provisions of this Ordinance. SECTION 4. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and each and every section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase not declared invalid or unconstitutional without regard to whether any portion of the Ordinance would be subsequently declared invalid or unconstitutional. SECTION 5. The City of Mill Valley finds that there is no possibility that the implementation of this Ordinance will have significant effects on the env Pursuant to 14 California Code of Regulations, Chapter B, Article 19, Sections 15307 and 15308, this Ordinance is categorically exempt from the alifornia Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) in that the City Council of the City of Mill Valley acting as a regulatory agency, is exempt from actions taken to protect natural resources (1530) and the environment (15308). SECTION 6. This Ordinance shall be effective 30 days following its adoption by the City Council. RESOLUTION NO. 11-51

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MILL VALLEY DECLARING SINGLE-USE CARRYOUT BAGS AN ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERN

WHEREAS, the Marin Hazardous and Solid Waste Joint Powers Authority (JPA) has determined that paper and plastic single-use carryout bags are of concern to the environment because of their one time use; and

WHEREAS, litter collection for beaches, highways, cities and counties cost the state \$303.2 million each year; plastics make up about 10% of Marin's waste stream and account for visual blight, environmental damage, and cleanup costs; and

WHEREAS, Single-use plastic bags are the second most common item found in statewide beach clean up days; and

WHEREAS, the problems resulting from all types of plastics in the environment effects the world beyond the City of Mill Valley. City of Mill Valley land-based debris, especially bags, packaging and single-use disposable products, are conveyed through storm drains to local creeks, into the San Francisco Bay and into the Pacific Ocean, endangering marine and wildlife; and

WHEREAS, the City of Mill Valley is dedicated to achieving the Zero Waste goal set forth by the JPA.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Mill Valley City Council hereby determines the following:

- The City of Mill Valley strongly encourages all retailers to provide an incentive for customers who bring their own bag.
- The City of Mill Valley encourages citizens to use reusable bags for purchases at retailers.
- The City of Mill Valley requires the use of recyclable or compostable takeout food containers.
- The Mill Valley City Council is committed to the consideration of the Ban on Single-Use Plastics similar to the Ordinance passed by the County of Marin.
